

Report of stay abroad in Brighton, UK

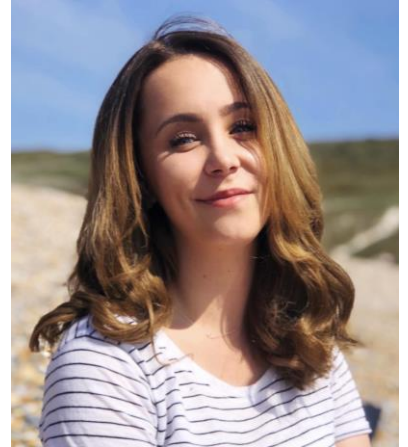

2. The stay abroad

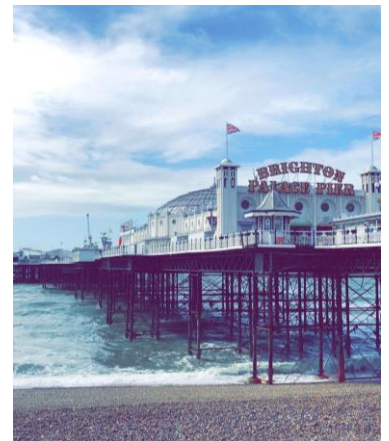
Brighton

Located at the south coast of England, 76 km away from London, Brighton is one of the UK's most popular destinations. An important fact is that Brighton is actually formally known as the city of Brighton and Hove. These two towns have about 230.000 inhabitants (2011).

This is the result of a survey which I totally agree with. During the four weeks I explored Brighton a lot and met so many new people from all cultures, ages and styles.

I visited for example the Seven Sisters cliffs, the Brighton Pier and Brighton Marina. There is also a huge shopping centre called Churchill Square Mall but across nearly every street in the centre you find popular shops like H&M, GAP, Primark,... but also small beautiful boutiques. Brighton offers a wide range of pubs, clubs and bars which are opened 7 days a week. This opportunity is also ideal to meet new people from all over the world.



The inhabitants of Brighton are unbelievable kind and helpful as distinct to German people. People in Brighton seem to be much happier (I mean: who can be unhappy when he/she lives at the beach?!).

Host family

The language course

In the first week I did a language course at the ELC (English Language Centre). Based on a short test in advance we have been divided in different groups which were adapted to our level of English. Our morning group was different from our afternoon group.



The course is very helpful to improve your English skills because you learn the pronunciation of British people and grammar.

You also meet a lot of new people from so many different countries. My classmates were from Turkey, Italy, Korea, Spain, France, Columbia, Japan, China and Switzerland.

The internship

After the language course, I did a three-week internship at the World Cetacean Alliance (WCA).

The World Cetacean Alliance is the world's largest partnership working to protect whales, dolphins and porpoises.

My tasks included:

- Research for possible cooperation partners
- Organisation of Skype conferences
- Creating Excel charts and PowerPoint presentations



- Creating an invitation for the conference in Florida and inviting our partners from all over the world

We were a small team so it felt very familiar. The best thing about my internship was that I directly worked at the beach near the Brighton Palace Pier, so I always had the possibility to have lunch at the beach. To be honest I liked the language course more than the internship because at the company you don't improve your English skills as much as at the language school. But all in all it was a nice experience to work in a different country and I can

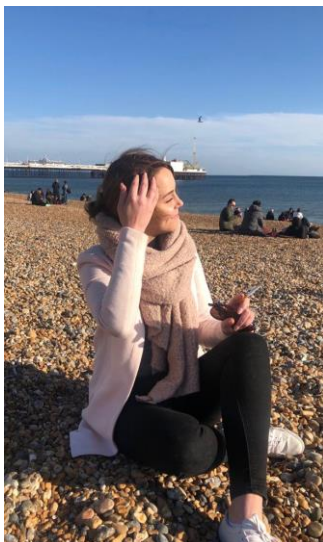


imagine working abroad.
